Keeping up with the Ordinances – Some New & Some Old

With spring right around the corner, we'd like to remind our residents of some ordinances that should be followed.

Ordinance 2015-02 states: "Whereas, the unique natural environment of Dune Acres is a basic natural resource of the community; and whereas the quality of this shared resource may be adversely impacted by landscaping, tree removal, and other grounds maintenance activities undertaken on private property a new ordinance must be added.... 1. Landscaper and Grounds Maintenance Contractor Registration (a) No person, firm, partnership or other entity shall contract, either orally or in writing, for landscaping services or lawn or grounds maintenance services within the Town of Dune Acres without first registering with the Town... (b) ..."landscaping services or lawn or grounds maintenance services" includes, but is not limited to, the planning and the planting of trees, shrubs, flowers, bulbs and other plants for the purpose of beautifying the premises: grading; the application of fertilizers and top soil; installation of lawn sod or seed; brush and leaf removal; herbicide application; tree trimming and tree removal; lawn mowing and trimming; irrigation; landscape illumination or lighting; and mechanical snow removal. (c)...However, those persons, firms, partnerships or other entities regulated solely by this section shall be exempt from the insurance and bonding requirements of Section 10-30..."

Exceptions to this provision include "Minors doing yard work, snow removal or other casual chores in and about a one-family, owner-occupied residence. Casual means occasionally, without regularity, foresight, plan or method."

Another new ordinance addresses **when a building permit is necessary**. Ordinance 2015-03 Building and Building Regulations amends a previous ordinance. It states: "1. Sec. 1025. Permits Generally (a) **Permits required**. It shall be unlawful to erect, construct, convert, demolish, remodel, enlarge, move, remove, reroof, reside or repair any building or structure in the Town, or install equipment for the operation of a building or structure, or commence the clearing, grading, excavation, filling, tree removal, or paving any parcel of land, or make any improvements required by Chapter 30 (Subdivisions), **the total cost of which exceeds three thousand dollars (\$3,000.00) in materials and labor**,

SONG OF MY LIFE: A MEMOIR by HARRY MARK PETRAKIS, reviewed by Alex Vavoulis

This great Greek-American author has now written this memoir; having lived ninety years he is not only entitled to write it, but he is probably the only one that can do it justice. This is a special Song he writes; it keeps the reader riveted because the writing is so fluid and sensitive and with a depth and humility that the reader will feel that he or she is learning about a man of culture, intelligence and an intellectual capacity that is rare among human beings.

After reading this book, the reader will not be surprised that the author received an Honorary Doctorate Degree of Humane Letters from the American College of Greece in Athens (the sixth such doctorate he has received) or that the Noble Laureate, Isaac Bashevis Singer said that "Harry Mark Petrakis is good news in American Literature" or that he won the O'Henry Award that is given to short story writers of exceptional merit. (He has received other accolades, too numerous to include in this review.)

He was also the award-winning author in 2001 for Dream of Kings and The Hour of the Bell. In regard to The Hour of the Bell, Singer said it is "a tale of the 1821 War of Independence which will endure as a remarkable literary achievement." In this novel, Petrakis writes of the Greeks rising up to achieve freedom from some 400 years of Ottoman occupation. Having read this novel, I certainly concur with Singer's statement.

In this memoir, Petrakis details the many times he gave lectures and taught classes in many colleges, universities and schools in many parts of the U.S. He shows his natural ability to be a teacher in writing a chapter with the title Education. From this chapter I offer the following two paragraphs:

Lest any young aspiring writer use my meager academic resume to justify their own indolence and downgrade the value of education, let me warn them that the course of my life has been a bewildering series of incongruous events. There is no lesson to be learned besides the obvious one that an outcome often depends on the vagaries of chance.

In the end, abandoning my formal education did not impede my life as a writer. At the same time, if I had remained in school, perhaps some perceptive high school or college teacher might have recognized in me some glimmering of writing talent and been able to offer me guidance. Under more enlightened tutelage, I might not have had to serve a ten year apprenticeship before selling my first story.

In a not too complicated way, one can discern Petrakis' process of integrating his experiences and knowledge to a progressively fuller and active life. The book also describes eloquently, and at times with poignancy, his experience of how a person can actualize one's potential no matter how many environmental obstacles are encountered. The book is recommended with enthusiasm.

Beware of Scams

The Porter County Sheriff has invited a group of representatives from law enforcement, fire departments, senior health care providers, clergy, social service organizations, assisted living and nursing facilities, YMCA's, state and local agencies dedicated to educating seniors to organize and provide information about what services are available for senior citizens. I represent Dune Acres.

At the meeting on March 3rd, which focused on scams, I was amazed to find fifty people there who are all involved in this organization. I was also very surprised to learn about so many scams, identify theft, and ways to take advantage of us that are happening in our county. The scam of the month is calling to tell you that you owe back taxes that must be paid immediately or you will go to jail. Many, many people fall for this and give their bank account information so the taxes can be paid directly to the IRS. The phone number on your telephone actually says IRS. Others are offering to fix your ceilings, roofs, driveways, and landscaping and demand an upfront payment. We discussed this at our Elderberry meeting and some folks reported receiving phone calls like this. There is one resident in town who has experienced a very costly scam.

Home healthcare workers steal medication and money, etc.; family members take advantage of their parents or grandparents; and on and on. The nursing homes reported that these problems occur on a daily basis.

We must all be on the alert for these issues and report abuses immediately to the Sheriff's office. The fire departments are very involved as they have sections on teaching seniors how not to be victims as do several other organizations. If you know of any of this kind of problem I would appreciate it if you would call me at 787-8104. I will have someone come to educate us later in the year. *by Mary Ann Crayton*

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without first obtaining a Building Permit..." Please read the entire ordinance on our website.

As a reminder...**Only Property Owners or residents, who have been issued a current Parking Permit, may obtain a Guest parking Permit from the Security Office.** This will be necessary for any cars that park at the beach parking lots, the tennis court or Town Hall parking lots or on the street.

Also, if you are planning a party or get together you may now bypass the requirement of obtaining guest parking passes for roadside parking by giving Security advanced notice by phone with the date, time and estimated length of the party with an approximate number of vehicles that may park on the street. "All attempts to use the owner's driveway must first be made before parking on the street. **Designated beach parking may not be used for the private event guest parking**. Time will be limited to 12 hours with no overnight street parking allowed." See Ordinance 2014-4 for its entirety.

Remembering Henry Studebaker

I am so sad to learn of Henry's passing. We are moving back to the Boston area in May after 11 years in Cape Town, and I was hoping we could visit him and his wife Marian in the next couple of years.

Hank and Art were iconic, heroic figures for us kids in the Dunes, perhaps at Chesterton High as well, but I was too young to know about that. There weren't many of us then. At first, my first year in the Dunes, when I was six and started first grade at Porter Grade School, there were only eight of us who caught Eschy's bus at the first intersection coming in from highway 12, where the three mail boxes that served the whole town waited with red flags up. Hank and Art; George, Lynn, and Cissy Bennett, and Marcia, Clare, and Billy Hilliker. The Martin kids joined a little later. A number of the kids then were summer kids, like the Rogers and the Schmidts and the Bahlkes and the Sullivans and the O'Sullivans and the Marhavers and the MacNamaras and the Saladins. The Studebakers were the famous pioneer family of the town. A.K., "Studie," built our concrete block house on the Circle in 1940 with a dangling cigarette and a great laugh. His concrete block factory was quite something, a little frightening for a little boy. I wandered all over the place by myself, but I only went into the block plant once by myself. Hank was eight years older than I. He had a great smile, a wonderful naughty chuckle, and a hearty laugh that served his ready sense of humor. Soon, in those years, the boys had the Model A pick-up that, I hope, still resides either in the garage of the Studebaker house or in the barn the brothers built to house their collection. Sometimes, when we were lucky, Hank would let us ride in the back as he drove us around, or up Parmalee hill, we called it, to our house. Hank drove that truck on many adventures. I'm sure he and Art helped out at the farm, but I didn't know much about the farm. I know they used it to deliver tomatoes to South Shore Drive and to service various farm outbuildings in the area. I used to hang out alone at the Live Dune as an Indian, sometimes scouting along Knife Ridge or greeting dawn at the top of the Jump-off, and once, looking over the edge into the forest below, I saw the brothers driving the Model A through the woods, just seeing what it could do. One summer he and Art and John Stocks, who came out for summers from Chicago, built a wonderful tunnel system in the side of the hill near their house, and they let me go in once. How scary, how well-built it was, tunnels and a room in the sand hill held up with a structure of boards, lit with a kerosene lamp. What a lucky treat for me,

the young guy, to be allowed in. Henry and my sister Marcia dated for quite a while; John and my sister Clare went together and later married for a while and had three wonderful kids.

When we moved to New Orleans in 1947, Henry and Art and George Starr drove down in the big Lincoln Cosmo and visited. Henry was in the Navy then. We weren't in touch for a long time, but, as it happens with people who are important in your life, you hear about them, and I heard that Henry went to Purdue and got an MBA at the University of Chicago, married Cynthia, and worked at the Bishop in Honolulu. I did a little research project there in the 1960's; it's quite a place. When Linda and I moved to a Boston suburb in the early 70's, and raised our two boys there, Henry stayed with us a couple of times when he had work to do at nearby Naval installations. He was so great with the boys, a good listener and a good teacher. We did a trip west when our boys were young teenagers and stopped by at Dune Acres for a visit. We spent part of an afternoon at the Studebaker house. Art was up from Indianapolis, and they showed Adam, our younger son, all through the Model A, and I think they started it up. It was a big moment for Adam. I am sure that it added to Adam's abiding interest in cars which led him, as a young adult, to do hill climbing in modified first-generation Mini. I always think of Henry and Art when I remember Adam doing his thing with his Mini. Hill climbing is related to driving around in the forest.

One year we decided to have a reunion for those who were kids and 1930's and 40's. It was around 1991. (Forgive me; all our records are on a ship headed for the US, so I don't have any memory aids). Henry and I pretty much put it together, thanks to email, regular mail, and the telephone. We both did a lot of work, finding and communicating with the "eligibles," and he did a lot more work than I did, for he put together most of the program. It was wonderful. BG and his wife had us over for drinks and a barbecue on the first evening to kick things off, and we had meals at the Club House where we talked and ate and drank into the night for a couple of days and wandered around the glorious lakeshore and the dunes and drove around and found everyone's houses and explored the Tamarack Trail. It reminded me of staying in the Guest House while our house was being built, for in those days we could get meals at the Guest House. It was marvelous to see the beautiful teenagers as grandparents and to mix memories and the present and catch up, a precious time.
