Kids and parents celebrated Easter with a festive and fun egg hunt at the town park.




Welcome New Residents!

Ancillaerie: A New Cultural Gem in Chesterton's Historic District

Nestled in the heart of Chesterton's Commercial Historic District at 109 S.Calumet Rd, Ancillaerie is the town's new destination for custom framing and fine art. Launched in 2024, Ancillaerie is guided by classically trained artist-framers Kristina Knowski and Aaron Melendez. Knowski, originally from the American Academy of Art in Chicago, began framing professionally at Framing Concepts in Chesterton in 2015. Partnered with Melendez—also a Marine veteran and academy-trained artist—they offer award-winning, conservation-focused craftsmanship.

The shop offers custom picture framing for prints, watercolors, textiles, memorabilia, and more. In fact, many of us have had our Dune Acres poster framed by Kristina! I was delighted with the framing work that Kristina did for a portrait of my dog.

Ancillaerie also offers giclée printing - museum-grade art printing suitable for artists and collectors looking for reproduction options. Remembering Robert Hartmann

Robert F. "Bob" Hartmann died peacefully on Saturday, April 12, 2025. He was 85 years old.

Throughout his life, of the thousands of times that friends and family asked "How are you, Bob?", 99% of the time he answered "Great!" He exuded positive energy and loved life to the fullest. Bob grew up in Cincinnati, OH, went to the University of Cincinnati where he earned a BS degree in Metallurgical Engineering, joined Phi Delta Theta fraternity, and met his wonderful wife, Margo. They moved to Northwest Indiana in 1962 where Bob worked at US Steel Corporation first, and then at Bethlehem Steel Corporation for the rest of his professional career. He earned his MBA in Marketing from Northwestern University in 1967.



Bob loved baseball and was a life-long Cincinnati Reds fan along with being an enthusiastic Fantasy Baseball participant. He was also an avid UC Bearcats sports fan. He and Margo are devoted members of the Ogden Dunes Community Church where he served as an elder, choir member, and Memorial Garden steward.

Bob lived his values, reflected in his generous spirit of volunteerism. He and Margo co-founded the Booster Club when their girls were at Chesterton High School. Bob served on the Franciscan Hospital Community Board for several years, and he was an active volunteer at the Westchester Township Historical Museum.

Bob and Margo moved to Dune Acres in 1972 where he relished the natural and wild beauty of the place, whether walking on the beach, hiking and cross-country skiing in the dunes, or watching birds from the house. He enjoyed playing and teaching tennis down at the park and ice-skating with his young daughters.

Bob was on the Dune Acres Town Council for many years (1974-79, 1984-85, 1992-95), serving as President at times during each of those periods. He was also an enthusiastic member of the Flora Richardson Foundation Board when it was first getting started, and then served as President of the Board for multiple terms (2001, 2002, 2005, 2006-12) and Vice-President as well (2003-04, 2020). He truly loved facilitating student visits to the Wildlife refuge, especially for kids who wouldn't otherwise have that opportunity.

From volunteering in leadership roles to hosting social events, Bob and Margo were fully immersed in Dune Acres life, fostering life-long friends over the years. As an example, for more than 40 years, they hosted a Christmas caroling party, initially inviting their daughters' friends and then later expanding it to their friends. It was always a joyful event, reminding everyone of the power of song, generosity, and the Christmas spirit.

Fun-loving and hard-working, Bob's priorities were family and friends, faith, and country. He was also famous for telling stories, entertaining friends and family with jokes and tall tales, and never missing an opportunity for a practical joke (especially for an audience of kids!). In addition to activities mentioned above, Bob loved playing golf and researching new exciting places to take his family on vacations.

Town Safety Buoys


As part of his responsibilities as Dune Acres Beach Commissioner, Rob Carstens ensures that the town's safety buoys are installed and properly positioned along the town's 2.3-mile lakefront each year.

Rob coordinates with South Shore Marina of Portage as needed and accompanies the crew during the buoy installation, following pre-determined GPS drop points. At the end of the season, he reviews any broken or missing parts that need replacement for the following year. The town allocates approximately \$15,000 annually for this service.

Lake Michigan is a public, navigable waterway regulated by multiple agencies. The Indiana Department of Natural Resources (DNR) issues permits for all structures placed in the lake, including the Dune Acres buoys. This annual permitting process may include inspections by DNR officials to verify that the buoys are properly labeled and maintained.

The town's buoys are designed to protect swimmers and to encourage boaters to remain outside the designated swimming area. However, they cannot prevent boaters from engaging in any lawful activity in navigable waters, including cruising within the marked area or anchoring for recreational purposes.

Environmental Restoration: How we turned our 76 West Road Lakeside Lawn into a Native Prairie

PART 1 - 1994-1999

In 1994, after 10 years at 48 West Road, Michael and I purchased a new home at 76 West Road, described as one of the most beautiful estate settings along the Indiana Shoreline!

The previous owner had demolished an existing 1960's A-frame in order to build the home we bought in 1994. They repaired the severely compromised site by creating a vast, flat, green suburban lawn. Yes, for the first few years, Michael did man the lawnmower from time to time!

We felt the lawn was totally out of place in the dunes. We knew this had to change. We would transform our flat boring lawn into a rolling duneland prairie-scape! No lawn! No manicured gardens! No deer fences! No irrigation or mowing!

We found our perfect landscape architect, Chicago-based Doug Hoerr, to make the magic happen. Doug's goal was to make it look like no one had ever interfered with Mother Nature! Our contractor, Chesterton-based Mark Breitzke (builder of the home) would assist, and architect John Banks of Chicago and Michigan would design a spacious gazebo as part of the project.

PART 2 - 2000 - 2025

After excavating to eradicate any evidence of the lawn, there were hills and valleys again! A sinuous curving ribbon of wood steps was added, along with a gazebo that was enhanced by the 1950s Belgian block/granite path that lead through the dune to the beach.

Instead of a lawn, now there was Little Blue Stem blowing in the wind, which shifts color during the year from blue-green to golden. Botanist Sandy O'Brien - recommended by Dune Acres legend Barbara Plampin, has added wildflowers giving us vibrant bursts of various colors over the summer season.

The best way to maintain such a prairie is with occasional controlled burns (always permitted by IDEM and approved by the Town Council.) A gentle scorching of the area in late fall or late winter by experienced professionals safely eliminates underbrush and allows the grasses and flowers to regenerate better and fuller than ever!

Wildlife News!

Cowles Bog had a special visitor! Styx, a banded Whooping Crane, arrived on Saturday May 3 with a group of Sandhill Cranes. She stood out from the crowd not only because of her bright white color, but also because she was much bigger than the Sandhills.

The whooping crane is an endangered species, native to North America, named for its "whooping" calls. Along with the sandhill crane, it is one of only two crane species native to North America, and it is also the tallest North American bird species and has an estimated 22–24 year life expectancy in the wild. After being pushed to the brink of extinction by hunting and loss of habitat, there were just 21 wild cranes by 1941. Now there are



around 700 in the U.S. and only 75 travel in our flyway. We sent photos of the bands to the International Crane Foundation and they were to identify this bird as "Styx", a one year old female who was born in Wisconsin. She spent the winter in Tennessee and stopped over here for four days on her way back north. Once the news was out we had many visitors trying to catch a view of this rare bird. We are wishing her safe and swift travels!

A notable number of snapping turtles chose to lay their eggs around the DA guard house this year. Guards, residents and Maintenance manager Mark Taylor have taken steps to help protect the eggs from predators.

Snapping turtles typically lay their eggs in late spring or early summer, digging nests in well-drained, sunny areas like sandy banks or even lawns. A female snapping turtle will excavate a cavity with her powerful hind legs, deposit 20-40 eggs and then cover the nest with sand or dirt. The entire process can take a few hours. The eggs, which are round and white, are vulnerable to predators, so turtles lay a large number of eggs to increase the chances of some offspring surviving.
