Dune Acres - The Original Plan

100 years ago...

A painting of the plan for Dune Acres has been hanging in the Clubhouse for nearly 100 years, and has just been restored. When the Town of Dune Acres was conceived the planner of the town, A.P. Melton (also the planner of the City of Gary) commissioned an “aerial view” painted map of the planned town of Dune Acres. The painting shows what was initially planned for our town.



It is interesting to see the difference between what was planned and what has been built. The painting shows a small boat marina just south of what is now our East Beach, a golf course from West Road into the land and dunes to the south, and many streets which were never built. After the market failures and the start of the Depression in the 1930's building slowed down and the town's vision changed. The restoration of this painting was extensive and costly. The restoration was done in late August and September by Margaret Sawczuck of the Arts Objects Conservation Lab. She repaired the damage: made a new stretcher to eliminate wrinkles, stabilized tears in the canvas and replaced old patches, and cleaned the oil-painted surface to get rid of decades of grime. A generous donation by Bill and DeeDee Spence was offered to get this project started, and the Town and the Dune Acres Civic Improvement Foundation are collaborating on the total cost. The painting is in the clubhouse to view.

We shared stories with neighbor Tony Schirripa who purchased our previous home at 46 Circle Drive. We had purchased the home in 2006 from Jane Dunne, a lovely woman who died in January 2025 at the rich age of 91.



On the beautiful September day, we were reminded again that we don't "own" as much as we "steward" these gifts we call home. People before us worked on these properties and cultivated the land, and others will work, enjoy and cultivate after we are gone. We were just grateful to take our place among these neighbors and friends for the time we are here.

We raised our glasses – toasting and celebrating these people, and this moment, and felt so glad to be part of it all.

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Meet the Guard

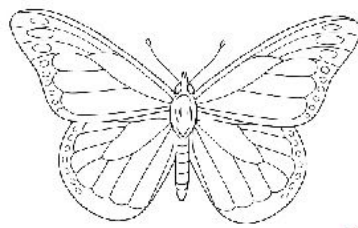

The devastating effects of mosquito ‘fogging’ and other pesticide use was emphasized. Questions were numerous, with all attendees going home with a package of milkweed seeds! Beach Access

Throughout Dune Acres' 100-year history, town officials have remained committed to preserving beach access for residents along the community's shoreline. This ongoing effort has included negotiating easement rights, maintaining infrastructure, and ensuring beachgoers respect adjacent private property. Parking in designated areas requires a Dune Acres parking sticker.

EAST BEACH:

Multiple parking spots are available. In-season boat storage is allowed on the beach. Access to the beach is via the main path, via the dune cutout across from the port-a-potty, and via the metal stairs on Beach Drive. The stairway down from Circle Drive provides additional pedestrian access. The wooden walkway at the west end of Beach Drive is private and not for public use. *(New Circle Drive stairs pictured, right.)*



RIDGE BEACH:

Multiple parking spots are available. In-season boat storage is allowed on the beach. Access to the beach is via the stairway with viewing deck. The stairway down from Crest Drive provides additional pedestrian access.

SHORE DRIVE:

Pedestrian access is between 6 Shore Drive and 8 Shore Drive. Storage of boats or beach paraphernalia is not allowed at this access point. Please respect the privacy and private property of adjacent homeowners.

OAK DRIVE:

Pedestrian access is via the western edge of the pavement at 22 Oak Drive, then left at the signed walking path. Please respect the private property of the residents. Vehicular use of the drive is prohibited.

HILL DRIVE:

There are two parking spots on the north side of Hill Drive and a stairway with viewing deck leading to the beach. This is the main west side beach access point. WEST ROAD AT CYPRESS:

Parking is available on the south side of West Road at Cypress Lane that serves the signed beach path on the opposite side of West Road. This path is an easement across private property. Overnight storage of watercraft and beach paraphernalia on the beach is prohibited. Please respect the private property of residents.
